Business Impact Estimate

Ordinance 2025-12 - An Ordinance of the City Commission of the City of Starke, Florida, Relating to Chapter 2, Article III; Repealing and Replacing the Chief Administrative Officer and General Manager Positions with the Position of the City Manager in the City of Starke, Florida; Repealing Chapter 2, Article III, Division 5, Entitled the General Manager; Assigning all duties of the Chief Administrative Officer and the General Manager to the Position of the City Manager; Updating Policies, Procedures, and Handbooks; Providing Direction for Codification of this Ordinance; Repealing all Ordinances in Conflict; Providing for Severability; and Providing for an Effective Date.

This Business Impact Estimate is provided in accordance with section 166.041(4), Florida Statutes. 1. Summary of the proposed ordinance (must include a statement of the public purpose, such as serving the public health, safety, morals and welfare):

The proposed ordinance repeals the existing positions of Chief Administrative Officer and General Manager, both of which reported directly to the City Commission, and consolidates their responsibilities into a single City Manager position. The City Manager will serve as the chief executive administrator, reporting directly to the City Commission, and will be responsible for overseeing city operations, public works, utilities, finance department, and personnel. This ordinance enhances efficiency, eliminates redundancy, and improves accountability in city government, thereby serving the public welfare by ensuring a clearer structure of municipal administration.

- 2. An estimate of the direct economic impact of the proposed ordinance on private, forprofit businesses in the City of Starke, if any:
- (a) An estimate of direct compliance costs that businesses may reasonably incur;

None. The ordinance does not impose any compliance obligations on private businesses.

None. This ordinance pertains strictly to internal governance and staffing structure of the City and does not directly regulate or impose requirements on businesses.

4. Additional information the governing body deems useful (if any):

This ordinance is a generally applicable measure that affects internal municipal administration and does not single out or directly impact private businesses. Because it consolidates management into a single position, the measure is anticipated to increase efficiency in city operations, which may indirectly benefit businesses and residents by streamlining decision-making and service delivery.
